MOTION TO OPEN MEETING: Chair Rev Reginald Tuggle officially called the meeting to order at 6:05 P.M. A motion was made by DWashington, to open the Board Meeting. The motion seconded by Burden.

INTRODUCTORY COMMENTS: INTRODUCTORY COMMENTS: Chair opened the meeting with a welcome to everyone, on behalf of the entire board, noting this was the last meeting for the academic school year. The Chair commented on the board optimistically looking forward to the NYS ELA/Math exam results as well as 8th grade Math Regents exam results. The Chair thanked the board members, principals for their leadership, teachers and teacher assistance for their collective work with students/families and operations team for their diligence in completing another school year successfully. The board extended best wishes to everyone, for a safe summer. It was noted that preparations are ongoing for the upcoming summer session. This includes Summer School, Summer Tennis/Soccer Camp and Professional Development. The Chair further commented on the graduation ceremony held at Hofstra University. Rev Tuggle and invited Nassau County officials (Deputy County Executive and County Comptroller) addressed the students. Trustee Arroyo introduced the invited guest speakers.

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SCHOOL OPERATION Budget Update: – Chief Operation's/Financial Officer (COO&CFO) presented the Updated Enrollment presentation for 2022-23. Enrollment update presented reflected a student count of 704 as of June 20th. Ahead of last year's pace. Of that total 542 students re-registered. Incoming students registered 162. Of that total 82 were incoming Kindergarten. The budget is based on student count of 700.

The **DRAFT** Budget for fiscal 2023-24 presented as of June 30th reflected 2023 Enrollment Budget 800. Total budgeted full year (FY) revenue is \$13.6 million. Total budgeted (FY) direct expenses \$9.3 million. Total budgeted (FY) indirect expense is \$3.6 million.

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Middle School Report:

ACADEMICS:

- ❖ The NYS 8th grade science performance and written assessment was administered on May 31st and June 5th respectively. Students were encouraged to take the assessment. Students who still choose to opt out were given the previous year's NYS assessment to complete during the administration of the assessment. 4 students chose to opt out of the assessment. This equates to less than 1% of the eighth-grade students.
- ❖ The NYS Earth Science performance, Algebra 1, and Earth Science written Regents will take place on Monday, June 12, Thursday, June 15, and Friday, June 16 respectively. Earth Science has 17 students and Algebra 1 has 23 students.
- Our dress down day civic fundraiser continues to be a success. We were able to donate
 \$126 to the Town of Hempstead Animal Shelter from Friday, June 9 dress down event.
- ❖ We have begun discussions about staff development. We plan to focus staff development on Aggressive Monitoring, Targeted Instruction, Structure and Routine, Lesson Planning/Structure that is academically engaging, firming up Restorative Practices, etc.
- We are finalizing our plans for this year's graduation ceremonies and the Spring/Cultural Festival.

In ELA:

- ❖ 5th Grade students continue their study of the rainforest by conducting research using several resources to answer the question; How can I help the rainforest?
- 6th Grade students continue to learn about remarkable accomplishments in space science, focusing on the main events of the Space Race. Students compare and contrast two authors' presentations of the events in terms of content, author methods, and point of view.
- ❖ 7th Grade concludes the module "Epidemics and How They Spread", by incorporating information gained during the previous units to create a fictional 1st person narrative

about a specific epidemic that has occurred in the past.

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* 8th Grade completed their final module which focused on answering the question: "What were the causes and impacts of Japanese American internment camps?" They analyzed connections and distinctions, identifying significant ideas, and evaluating the film's depiction of events in the text. For the remainder of the year, they are reading Shakespeare, A Midsummer Night's Dream as a preparation for High School English.

In Math:

❖ 5th Grade is currently working on convert measurements of length with the customary system. 6th Grade is currently working on statistic measures: find the mean, median and mode. 7th Grade is currently working on construct triangles based on either angle or length measurements. 8th Grade is currently working on use properties of similar polygons to find distances or length that are difficult to measure directly. Algebra 1 is currently working on factor binomials that are the difference of squares; factor trinomials that are perfect squares.

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RTI

- ❖ 8th Grade students have completed their science exams and select 8th grade students will also be participating in The Algebra 1 regents and the Earth Science regents during the week of June 12th.
- ❖ RTI is now in the final cycle. All students have been reassessed to determine progress. A schoolwide average of 2.6 students per grade have exited the program during the last cycle due to sufficient progress. All students who remained in RTI for the final cycle will be reassessed in September to determine appropriate placement for the Fall. We will also ask for Teacher recommendation and all new students will be assessed through the intervention program.

Special Education:

- Annual IEP meetings are on-going for a handful of students. Most of our students have made progress towards meeting their annual goals and are slated to return to RCA next school year with the support of an IEP.
- ❖ 4 new IEPs have been added in the last few weeks. It was recommended that 2/4 of those students return to the district in an ICT program.
- ❖ We currently have 10 students who have completed evaluations and are now awaiting an initial IEP meeting. Initial IEP meetings will take place during June, and a few will take place over the summer with Mrs. Johnson present.
- ❖ The goal is to add at least 6 more IEPs to our SWD population by June to increase our Special Education #s.
- ❖ We have a total of 61 students with IEPs or 504s Kindergarten through 8th grade. We have 34 students with IEPS between K-4th grade and 2 504s. There are 19 students with IEPs and 6 with 504s between 5th-8th grade.
- ❖ IEP/504 students continue to receive testing accommodations for classroom exams as well as all state exams taking place this Spring.

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ENL Report:

❖ The ENL department completed the NYSESLAT exam throughout the month of May. The end of the year culminates with special projects as well as reading assignments. We are looking forward to the upcoming school year and anticipate the NYSESLAT results upon returning in September.

SEL & Guidance Counsellor Report:

❖ High School Placement – The High School Placement list for our Senior Class of 2023 has been finalized and sent to the staff and the board. The list will also be part of the students' yearbook.

Discipline Report:

- Restorative Modeling has been and will continue to be emulated in teachers' classrooms and in lesson plans.
- Classroom Values are posted in rooms along with Character Trait of the Month. Dean utilizes these traits with Restoratives Circles when necessary. This month/June-Cooperation
- ❖ 4 Circles were held in my office. 2 Fifth Grade- 2 Six Grade –Grade. Several Peer Meditation Recommendations were made to Guidance Counselor.
- Moments of Mindfulness meditation are scheduled every morning and afternoon to create a calm and community environment.
- Meditation Room has been established as an extra support room for those students who need to reflect on behaviors that are Tier 1 behaviors. An addition was added to the Meditation Reflection Room Sheet. Teachers must include why they are sending students to the room and call home as well as add the behaviors to Deans' List for documentation purposes.
- ❖ Mrs. McGrath and Dean Cralidis are creating a 7th grade strategy plan for discipline/SEL techniques for the 7C Health Class. Ms. McGrath will sit in on the class on Fridays.

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- Having Ms. McGrath in class for Music and Health has decreased major behavior patterns.
- ❖ Working with several staff members to ensure that students who have disciplinary issues and IEP's/504 Plans are receiving district mandates. Ms. Johnson and Ms. McGrath are assisting in this process. Several eighth-grade students are receiving copies of class notes who were not receiving copies of class notes.
- ❖ *Dean's List Shout Outs* for the teachers who are utilizing the system Deans' List, for calling home to notify parents of issues at school is in progress. This can be done weekly or monthly. Dress Down Passes for our top callers.
- ❖ The Community Service Program wraps up.
- ❖ Dean Cralidis is currently meeting with all eighth graders to discuss their progress in completing the 20-hour graduation requirement.
- 6 parent meetings this month to discuss grades and disciplinary issues.
- ❖ Working with Hempstead School District Bus Transport. There has been zero bus write up this board report. Parents of our bus students have worked with the Dean to cut down on disciplinary issues and to work with the district. One student in fifth grade has his own small bus due to medical and IEP accommodations.
- ❖ Alternative Placement continues for any student who needs to need placement on a shortor long-term level.
- Communication with administration is paramount. Dean communicates with Principal several times a day to discuss/review and creates strategies to make the middle school a safe and academically successful environment.

We ended the 2021-2022 academic school year at 54% of our students performing at a level 3 or 4. This was based upon the End of the Chapter assessments. In terms of the IReady Diagnostic assessment, 39% of our students were performing at a level 3 or 4 at the time of the third Diagnostic assessment.
- ➤ In the area of ELA, it is our goal is to have at least 45% of students performing at levels 3 and 4 in writing by the mid-year Benchmark assessment.
